## Getting dressed



Iron Age **CLOTHING** was made from **wool**, **linen** and **leather** (animal skins). In the winter people wore animal **furs** and wool **cloaks** to keep warm. But you couldn't just buy clothes from a shop. You had to make your own!

Archaeologists know about **IRON AGE** clothing because during our excavations we find the **tools** used to make them.



Spindle whorls were used to twist and spin wool from sheep into thread.



the **thread** tight on the loom as it was woven into **fabric**.



Needles made from bone or metal were used to sew clothes together.

We don't have any pictures of Iron Age clothing.

We also don't usually find them during our excavations because natural materials like **wool** and **linen** break down quickly. But sometimes archaeologists are very lucky. They can find pieces of Iron Age clothing in wet places like **peat bogs**.

Clothing found in peat bogs tell us Iron Age people liked bright **colours**. They used dyes from **berries** and **plants** to make their clothes **blue**, **red**, **yellow**, and **green**.





## Make your own brooch

They didn't have zips or buttons in the Iron Age! They used **pins** and **brooches** instead.

These could be very simple or beautifully **decorated**. How brooches looked and what they were made from tell the archaeologists a lot about the person who owned it. The more gold and decoration, the richer you probably were!

Brooches could also be **traded** from other parts of Britain, or places like France.



**ACTIVITY**: It's time to dress to impress and make your own brooch!
